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But through it all, I loved the idea of combining art with the functional. But, I didn't just want to leave those beautiful wood pieces on a shelf. That is when I began to experiment


with "wearable" art. I first began by making purses in several styles and through several iterations. I then added jewelry. I had seen lots of wooden

disks hanging on leather straps, but I wanted to do something different. So I began to experiment. I turned hundreds of disks in varying sizes, beads in varying diameters, then began to hollow, burn, carve,

pierce and paint them.















## **President's Letter**



Turning 2017 is now behind us and I am pleased to say that it was a history making event. Before I tell you about some of that history I want to acknowledge the leadership provided by John Albachten and KC Kendall in making it happen. Along with a team consisting of Keith Betscher, Ian Collins, Tom Dresch, Kurt Foglesong, Mike Getz, Jack Gormley, Ron Hanssen, Dave Kratzer, Kevin Miller, Steve Shanesy, Arnold Ward, Tom Walters, Dwight Weaver, and a large number of volunteers they produced an event that we can all be very proud of. In my opinion its success keeps

the OVWG symposium head and shoulders above other regional woodturning symposia.

Symposium 2017 was historic in that we had an outstanding group of featured and guest demonstrators who helped to attract a record number of registrants - 304 over the three day period of the symposium. This resulted in a nice financial gain that will help us to rebuild the cushion the Board feels we should have in order to continue to be a healthy, dynamic, organization that is able to meet the turning needs of our members while fulfilling our stated mission: to provide education, information, and organization to people in the Cincinnati area interested in the art and craft of woodturning. We can now realistically consider such actions as equipment upgrades and the scheduling of more professional turners for demonstrations and classes.

I realize that some may view the earnings from the symposium as an indication that we do not need the fee increases that we recently announced. I assure you that this is not the case. In fact it helps to overcome the expense that we experienced with the equipping and build-out of the Learning Center - a sum of almost \$40,000. These expenses took a big portion of our financial cushion and put us in a situation which could have become critical if a symposium had had to be cancelled at the last minute for weather related or some other catastrophic event. I remind you of Hurricane Ike which passed through the greater Cincinnati area on September 14, 2008. This storm cut power to over 780,000 Duke Energy customers in the region. It would have wreaked havoc on an event such as ours. We keep our fingers crossed that our symposium is never hit by something like this, but because of this financial cushion we can feel reasonably certain that we can survive if it does.

One of the categories of membership that is identified in our chapter by-laws is that of **Lifetime Members.** These are General Members who have served the OVWG in an outstanding manner over several years. It is an honor that is not given often and then only to truly outstanding members. Members selected for this honor are exempt from payment of membership fees for life. I am pleased to say that on behalf of the Board I was able present this honor to KC Kendall for his tireless efforts and leadership that has helped to make the OVWG the envy of most other AAW chapters.

Now that Turning 2017 is complete we can focus our attention on the November monthly meeting and on other activities planned for the rest of the year. We are indeed fortunate to have Janice Levi as our guest on Saturday, November 18. Appropriately for the holiday season that is fast approaching, she will be demonstrating how to turn ornaments and finials. She will also be teaching a hands-on class on Sunday, November 19, on the same topics. There are only 3 spaces left in her class so I encourage you to register as soon as possible to assure that you get a spot. Another exciting activity that has just been added to the event calendar on December 9 & 10, is a 2-day class by Jim Duxbury on making kaleidoscopes. Rules for the contest are very simple: take a pine 2" X 4" that is up to 8 feet long and make a turned item. The 2" X 4" can be cut and glued together any way you wish to get to the final turned product. Be creative and show us what you can do.

In closing I want to remind you of the classes and open shops scheduled in the Learning Center and encourage you to take advantage of these opportunities to improve your turning skills. I look forward to seeing you at the November meeting.

# Tips and Information from the AAW

# **BOX LID ALIGNMENT PIN**

I like making lidded boxes from a single piece of wood with interesting grain or figure. Making the lid and box from the same piece of wood allows for the grain to flow continuously from box to lid, but it bothers me when the lid is rotated and the grain becomes misaligned. One simple, unobtrusive way to keep the lid aligned properly is to install a very small alignment pin where the lid meets the box. The pin is glued





into a hole in either the lid or the box, depending on your lid design. When the lid is rotated, it "clicks" into place in exactly the right position.

The idea is to align the grain as you like, drill a hole centered on the joint line between the lid and base, and glue in a pin. A short length of 14/2- gauge copper wire stripped of its sheathing, works well for the pin, though you could use skewer sticks or another type of thin cylindrical material. My copper wire measured about .080" on the digital calipers, so I drilled a 3/32" (2.4mm) hole to accept it. You'll have to size your hole according to the pin material you choose.

**Drill pinhole** - After you've turned your box, firmly tape the lid to the base with the grain aligned to your satisfaction. The tape keeps the grain in proper alignment and holds the lid tight against the box. The hole should be drilled straight into the box, not at an angle, so I use a V-block type jig to hold the box securely in place on the drill press table (Photo 1).

Align your drill bit exactly where the lid and box meet (Photo 2), so half the hole will be in the lid and half will be in the top edge of the box. Drill to a depth appropriate for your box lid design; my lid design allows me to drill about 3/4" (19mm) deep.

**Affix the pin -** Cut a piece of stripped wire about 1" (25mm) long. Smooth one end with abrasives to remove any sharp corners. Separate the lid from the box. Apply a bit of epoxy or cyanoacrylate (CA) glue to the hole in the lid (or box, depending on your design) and push the pin material into the hole. Allow the adhesive to cure, then trim the short length sticking out so it doesn't extend beyond the circumference of the lid, as shown in the opening image.

Now a simple turn of the top will "click" the lid into place with the most attractive grain pattern aligned beautifully. Someone suggested a dab of black marker to disguise the pin, but I like the look of the copper dot on the side of the box. You'll have to size your hole according to the pin material you choose.

## **Meet the Turner**

Name: Gary Brackett

**Occupation**: I spent 44 years as a traveling salesman, selling fasteners to automotive, industrial, construction and aerospace accounts for the first 33 years. My last eleven years I was a manufactures rep selling industrial and woodworking machinery for Jet/Powermatic, and other wood working suppliers, to dealers in the tristate.

Part of town you live in: : I live outside of New Richmond.

How many years have you been turning? 29 years

How many years have you been a member of OVWG? 28years. The club was started in 1988. Meetings were held at Shopsmith on Winton Rd, in Forest Park. I attended the second meeting and finally joined at the third meeting. I was hesitant to join as I was the only one who didn't own a Shopsmith.

What is your favorite item(s) to turn? I enjoy turning bowls the most. Over the years I have turned plates, platters, hollow forms, and ornaments, with bowls being my favorite. I have also turned a few furniture parts, but only for furniture I have made.

What is your favorite wood and why? My favorite wood is soft maple. Maple often times shows both spaulting or ambrosia patterns and a highlight of colors to enhance the wood. It is also easy to turn and finish.

**Do you have a favorite turning tool?** I am a big fan of the 3/8 bowl gouge for most turnings. I also have a few  $\frac{1}{2}$  gouges for bigger work.

Who/What was your greatest teacher/influence? John Jordan. In 1992, Dave Morrical and I spent a week with John at the Appalachian Center for the Crafts in Tn. This was before sharpening jigs so we had to learn to sharpen without fixtures. It was an intense class but John instilled in us the importance of good tool control, design, and the "curve".

**Favorite professional turner you would like to see demonstrate.** There are many I enjoy including Glen Lucas, Jimmy Clews, Rudy Lopez, and Chris Ramsey.

What was your happiest turning moment? When I became comfortable with bowl gouge and was able to see and turn a fair curve.

When you look at your turnings, what do you see? I see gradual improvement over the years with better tool control, design, finishing, and certainly more enjoyment with the process.

In addition to woodturning, what other crafts/hobbies do you enjoy? We own 5 and 1/2 acres of land with mainly woods, so cutting trees and splitting wood for burning takes up a lot of time year round. Taking care of the landscaping is a big obligation. I have made very little furniture since becoming hooked on woodturning, but still enjoy the process. I have also played guitar for over fifty years.
