

The “Best Dish” Recipes

2nd Place: Ron Hanssen

Ruby’s Bean Dish

1 lb bacon, fried and drained
 2 medium onions, diced
 1 small green pepper, diced
 28 oz can Bush’s Onion baked beans
 1 can each lima, kidney, and butter beans, drained and rinsed
 ¼ cup catsup
 ½ cup packed brown sugar
 ½ cup molasses
 1 tsp liquid smoke
 ½ cup BBQ sauce
 ¼ tsp dry mustard
 1 tsp prepared mustard
 2 tsp chili powder,
 4 cloves garlic, diced
 ½ cup white wine vinegar
 ¼ to ½ cup Worcestershire sauce
 pepper to taste
 hot sauce to taste
 ½ to 1 lb Polish Sausage (optional)

Mix all ingredients. Bake 350° for 1 hour. Stir every 15 minutes.

Canned Corn Casserole

1 15oz can whole kernel corn, drained
 1 15 oz can cream style corn
 1 box Jiffy Corn Muffin Mix
 ½ cup sugar (optional)
 2 well beaten eggs
 1 stick butter, melted
 1 cup sour cream

Mix all ingredients together. Bake 350° in a greased 9x13 dish for 1 hour, or until set. For the picnic, ingredients were doubled and baked in a 9x13 deep dish. Easy to assemble and delicious.

3rd Place: David Morrical

Sausage, Kale, and White Beans

1 lb Italian Sausage, fried and drained, cut or crumbled
 2 Tbsp olive oil
 12 oz kale, washed
 2 Tbsp water
 2 cloves garlic, minced
 ½ tsp salt
 ¼ tsp pepper
 ¼ tsp crushed red pepper
 2 (15 ½ oz) cans cannelloni beans or Great Northern with liquid
 1 (14 ½ oz) can whole tomatoes, or crushed
 2 cups chicken broth

Fry the sausage in the olive oil and drain. Remove the stalk from the kale and coarsely chop the leaves. Add them to a large pot with water. Cook until tender. Add the garlic, salt, pepper, and red pepper. Add the beans, tomatoes, sausage, and chicken broth and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer covered for 30 minutes. Stir occasionally. Makes 4-5 servings.


